**A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO ACCEPT THE
“STAFFING FOR ADEQUATE FIRE AND EMERGENCY RESPONSE
(SAFER)” GRANT FROM THE FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT
AGENCY (FEMA) AND THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND
SECURITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.**

WHEREAS, through the efforts of the Division of Fire, particularly through the efforts of Lieutenant Jason Buss, the City has been awarded a U.S. Department of Homeland Security/Federal Emergency Management Agency FY 2020 “Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER)” grant in the amount of \$1,007,663.94 for the purpose of hiring personnel to ensure the Division of Fire has adequate resources to respond and safely perform at incidents, providing protection from fire and fire-related hazards for the City;

WHEREAS, acceptance of said SAFER grant will benefit the City and its residents;

WHEREAS, by this Resolution, the City expresses its desire to accept the grant funds and to establish acceptance of the grant and Grant Agreement Articles through the Federal Emergency Management Agency’s Grant Outcomes portal;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Richmond Heights, State of Ohio, that:


Section 1: The Mayor is authorized to accept the SAFER grant and its funds thereunder and the Grant Agreement Articles through the Federal Emergency Management Agency’s Grant Outcomes portal in the amount of \$1,007,663.94.

Section 2: The City agrees that in accepting this grant, it will not deviate from the approved scope of work authorized therefor without prior written approval, by amendment request, from FEMA.

Section 3: It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.



The purpose of the SAFER Grant Program is to provide funding directly to fire departments and volunteer firefighter interest organizations to assist in increasing the number of firefighters to help communities meet industry minimum standards and attain 24-hour staffing to provide adequate protection from fire and fire-related hazards, and to fulfill traditional missions of fire departments. After careful consideration, FEMA has determined that the recipient's project or projects submitted as part of the recipient's application and detailed in the project narrative as well as the request details section of the application — including budget information — was consistent with the SAFER Grant Program's purpose and was worthy of award.

The Collective Bargaining agreement between the FF and city includes language in the "Uniform Allowance" section pertaining to turnout gear. Specifically, section 30.3 states "The employer shall supply all initially issued turn-out gear and replace such gear due t normal wear and tear at no cost to the employee." For this grant, these costs will be added to the year one benefits of a new firefighter. Ohio state purchasing contract was referenced for pricing determination. All new hires will be trained in the use of structural PPE.
