





### WINTER FIRE SAFETY

KEEP SNOW AND ICE 5 FEET AWAY FROM FIRE HYDRANTS

In case of a fire, firefighters need to be able to get to the hydrants quickly to protect people and property!

Here's a few more areas around your home to check and clear away any snow:

- Exterior vents for your furnace, clothes dryer, and hot water tank. If these vents cannot breathe, carbon monoxide can back up into your home.
- Also test your CO detector.



**A WINTER SAFETY MESSAGE FROM OUR SERVICE DEPARTMENT** Please be patient with our snowplow drivers when inclement conditions occur; it is our utmost goal to serve residents in a timely fashion, but inclement weather can delay service. Please, leave ample distance when driving behind a plow truck, as they have blind spots and may stop suddenly or back up.

Plowing, main roads are given priority, followed by secondary roads, then side streets and cul-de-sacs. The City is not responsible for removal of snow thrown into any driveway by City snow plows. Piles of snow in the road can create dangerous obstacles for motorists and the City snowplowing equipment, so residents and snowplowing contractors should avoid plowing, shoveling, or blowing any snow onto the road surface. If a person is reported placing snow in the roadway, he or she could be subject to a possible citation.

Residents should stress to their children to stay out of the path of snow being thrown off the plows, since there could be rocks or ice that could injure a child in its path. Also, children should NOT dig tunnels in the snow or build igloos near the roadway or roadside ditches.



***The city is not responsible for repairing or replacing a mailbox and/or post that is damaged or broken due to thrown snow.*** The homeowner may even want to consider installing a snow deflector shield. Everyone should inspect their mailbox to ensure it sits back 6-8 inches back from the curb, is secured properly to a **solid core 4"x4" post** and tighten all the screws and bolts. The post should be in stable and good condition (not lose or rotted). After inspection, if it has been determined that a mailbox and/or post has been directly struck by our snowplow equipment, it *may* be repaired or replaced by the city with a **conventional mailbox**, and a no larger than 4"x4" post.
